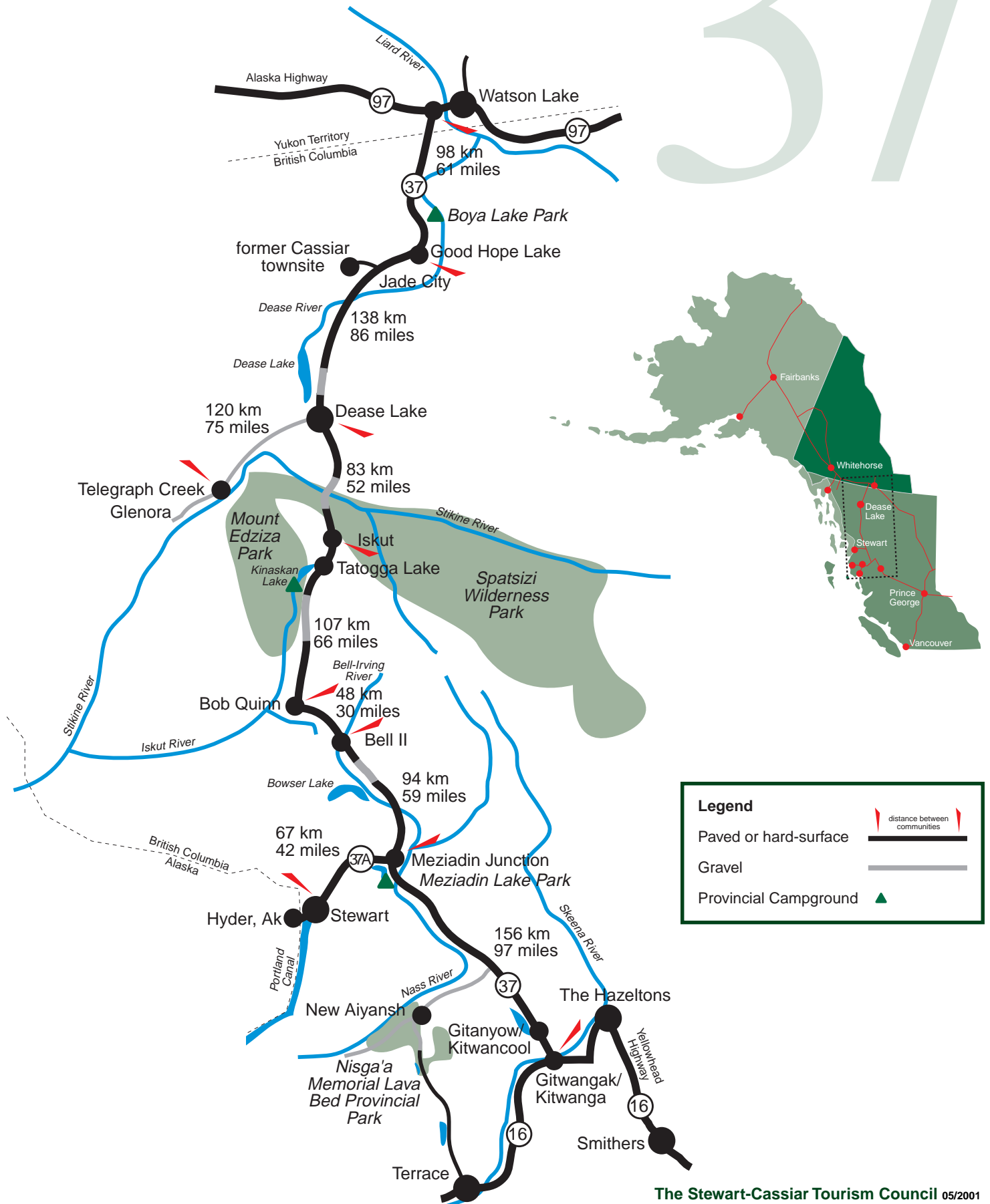


# STEWART-CASSIAR



# STEWART-CASSIAR

**Highway 37 North** is designated a remote highway that traverses through some of the most beautiful scenery in the province as it passes mountains, glaciers, rivers, lakes and canyons. The total distance from the junction of Highway 16 to the Yukon border is 725 km (450 miles). Over 85% of the route now has a hard surface (either pavement or sealcoat) leaving less than 15% gravel. Although there are some sections still being upgraded the road is fine for campers, motorhomes and vehicles towing trailers.

The following is a list of places, including the distance from the junction of Yellowhead Highway 16 and the Stewart-Cassiar Highway 37, where fuel, food and services may be purchased.

**0 km**      **Junction 16 & 37**  
Minor repairs, gas, diesel, groceries, restaurant

**76 km**      **Cranberry Junction**  
Cranberry Junction to New Aiyansh  
(a trip of 61 kilometres)

This is a narrow winding forest service road that is gravel. This road is an active logging road so exercise caution in driving it. It leads to New Aiyansh and the Nisga'a Lava Bed Park.

**139 km**      **Meziadin Lake General Store**  
gas, diesel, propane, groceries

**156 km**      **Meziadin Junction**  
gas, diesel, minor repairs, restaurant

**Meziadin Junction to Stewart**  
(a beautiful trip of 65 kilometres)

The road to **Stewart** is a side trip of 65 kilometres and is one of the most scenic drives in North America. The highway goes through towering coastal mountains whose slopes are capped with icefields and hanging glaciers. Numerous waterfalls tumble down the beautiful mountainsides. It is one of the only places in the world you can see glaciers close up from your vehicle. Stewart has a full range of services.

**250 km**      **Bell II**  
gas, diesel, propane, tire repairs, food services, accommodation

**390 km**      **Tatogga**  
gas, diesel, minor repairs  
(accommodation and restaurant/food services in the immediate area)

**405 km**      **Iskut**  
gas only and groceries  
(accommodation and restaurant/food services in the immediate area)

**488 km**      **Dease Lake**  
full services  
  
**Dease Lake to Telegraph Creek**  
(another beautiful trip of approximately 115 kilometres)

The road to **Telegraph Creek** is a fabulous trip but is not for large RVs or vehicles towing large trailers. There are no services along this road but Telegraph Creek has gas stations, store, groceries and accommodation services. (Be sure to reserve accommodations before travelling to Telegraph Creek for an overnight or longer stays.)

gas, groceries  
(limited hours of service)

**724 km**      **Junction 37 & Alaska Highway**  
gas, minor repairs, accommodation and restaurant
