ART adventures . . . on Yukon time

This guide is your invitation to slow down, slip into the easygoing rhythms of “Yukon time,” and discover a natural resource that is as good as gold: Yukon’s visual art.

For as long as people have lived in the Yukon, they have interpreted its stunning landscapes and fascinating cultures through visual art forms. Today, the styles of Yukon’s visual artists are as diverse as the territory itself. They range from whimsical to profound, elaborate to austere, utilitarian to decorative. With respect for both traditional and contemporary forms of expression, Yukon artists work in every conceivable medium and material. And in their vibrant, close-knit community, visitors and locals alike find countless opportunities to delight their senses, open their minds and lift their spirits.

Whether you want to watch an artist working in his or her studio, admire breathtaking public art, or purchase a precious piece to take home, each of the nine regions identified in this guide can offer uniquely rewarding experiences.

For each region, the guide provides information about Yukon visual artists who encourage you to visit them in their studios. There, you can observe them at their work, inquire about their backgrounds, learn about their materials, discuss their artistic philosophies or inspirations, and usually purchase work directly from them. Whether your interest lies in watercolour paintings, stone carvings, folk art, gold jewellery or decorative masks, you will always be able to find talented Yukon artisans willing to share their gifts with you.

The guide also identifies and briefly describes places in each region where you can view visual art—from outdoor sculpture to paintings, carving or other media in galleries—that reflect the Yukon experience.

Finally, the guide lists places, other than artists’ studios, where you can buy a work of art that captures the essence of your unforgettable Yukon adventure.

Artist listings

This guide provides information about Yukon artists in each region who welcome visitors to their studios or homes. In many cases, you will need to call ahead to ensure the artist is available, or to get detailed directions to find them. Getting there can become part of your adventure. Even if a listing states that the artist has certain hours, the best way to avoid disappointment is always to call ahead. Don't hesitate to ask artists what they may have to sell!

In regions where there is more than one community, be sure to review the listings before you visit to avoid missing an artist.

Yukon visitor reception centres

Business, Tourism and Culture Yukon operates visitor reception centres in Whitehorse, Dawson, Carcross, Watson Lake, Haines Junction and Beaver Creek. In addition to providing information about Yukon activities, accommodation and attractions, staff at these centres can supplement the information contained in this guide. Feel free to ask for assistance with contacting artists or locating studios.

There are municipal visitor reception centres in Carmacks, Faro and Mayo, and an unstaffed tourist information kiosk at the gas station in Stewart Crossing.

Watson Lake

Known as Canada's "Gateway to the Yukon," friendly Watson Lake welcomes visitors who travel up the Alaska or Stewart-Cassiar highways. An expansive boreal forest and a network of lakes and rivers surround the town, providing an attraction for outdoor enthusiasts. Watson Lake also enjoys exceptional winter viewing of the aurora borealis, which are magically recreated—year-round—inside a state-of-the-art theatre at the community's Northern Lights Space and Science Centre.

With its famous Sign Post Forest, Watson Lake can offer an intriguing start or quirky finish to a Yukon art adventure. Whether it is best described as organic sculpture or merely homesickness run amok, this collection of more than 50,000 signs—started in 1942 by a lonely U.S. soldier who wanted to commemorate his distant hometown—is a sight to remember.

Teslin

The name for this region's most prominent feature, Teslin Lake, comes from the Tlingit word "teslin-too," meaning "long narrow lake." On calm summer evenings, the lake's surface is like a mirror reflecting the majesty of surrounding mountains—a photographer's dream. The village of Teslin, located at the north end of the Alaska Highway's longest bridge, is the jumping off point for excursions onto the lake. The Nisutlin Delta National Wildlife Refuge is the most important waterfowl migration stopover in the Yukon.

Teslin's original inhabitants were coastal Tlingit who migrated inland. When they established their thriving community, they established a Yukon carving tradition to match. Today, the talented hands of their descendants nurture this tradition to the delight of art lovers around the world. The Tlingit Heritage Centre is an ideal place to view this carving tradition.

The Tlingit Heritage Centre and its surrounding grounds provide a venue for local artists and craftspeople to demonstrate their unique styles and abilities. At the entrance to the centre, five magnificent carved clan poles greet visitors. Each pole represents a clan of the Teslin Tlingit government. Inside the centre, the gift shop showcases First Nation art and culture, with special emphasis on Tlingit and other Yukon First Nation products. Southern Lakes

Carcross, Tagish, Marsh Lake, Crag Lake

For centuries, the interconnected waterways and mountain passes of the Southern Lakes region formed important trading routes for the Tlingit and Tagish First Nations. The route through one of these passes, known as the Chilkoot Trail, eventually gained worldwide notoriety as the gateway to the Klondike gold fields. The region's historic trails and natural features, including the world's smallest desert, are now inviting playgrounds for hikers, cyclists, canoeists, kayakers and other nature lovers.

Of course, this landscape of stunning beauty and legend offers no shortage of inspiration for visual artists. Some of the Yukon's most creative people make their homes in the region's idyllic lakefront communities, while others perfect their crafts along breathtaking valley roads that wind from one secluded retreat to the next.

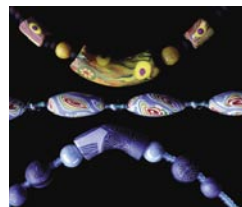

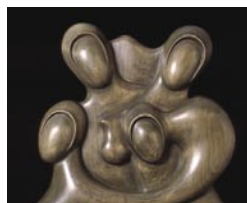

Elijah Smith Federal Building

A bronze statue of a miner and his pack dog, created by Chuck Buchanan, stands in the front square outside the building. Inside is a large relief sculpture created by the late Lilius Farley. Farley was an art teacher and nationally known sculptor. Her piece, *History of the Yukon*, 1955, which hangs over the main doors, reflects the mining history of the Yukon and was the first public art ever commissioned in the territory. A traditional button blanket entitled *Kwanlin Dun (River People)*, designed by Eddy Shorty and executed at Ashaw Ku (Elder's House) in Kwanlin Dun, hangs in the building as well.

Visitors can also view works by local artists commissioned for the federal building: a drum made by Joe Migwans featuring a portrait of Elijah Smith, drawn by Clifton Fred. Both of these works memorialize Elijah Smith, the renowned First Nations elder for whom the building is named.

Visitors will appreciate large murals by Halin de Repentigny, including one called *Traveler*, as well as a work entitled *Crow Makes the World* by Keith Wolfe Smarch (#7). The sculpture *Where Legends Meet* by Keith Wolfe Smarch (#7), Mark Porter and Brian Walker can also be found outside behind the centre. Life-size bronze sculptures of mammoths, located outside the centre, are clearly visible from the Alaska Highway.

Yukon Government Administration Building

The Yukon Government Administration Building Mural by West Vancouver artist David MacLagan is seen above the main foyer of the building in glass windows. It is a series of 24 panels portraying the historical evolution of the Yukon. The main foyer also houses exhibits from the Yukon Permanent Art Collection, which contains the work of northern artists and major artists from other parts of Canada. Among them, *The Departure of Persephone*, a three-piece panel by Ted Harrison, graces the entrance to the Yukon Legislature. Works from the collection are rotated three times a year.

The Women's Tapestries, designed by sisters Eve Aldis McBride and Julie Aldis, are a series of five hand-stitched panels depicting women's lives through the northern seasons. Created in 1976, the International Year of Women, this work represents many hours of collaboration by Yukon women. The tapestries are located in the member's lounge and can be viewed from the public area in the Executive Council offices.

Inside the legislative chamber, a tapestry by Joanne Staniszki hangs behind the Speaker's chair. This giant tapestry is titled *Fireweed* and is an abstraction of the fireweed plant, Yukon's floral emblem.

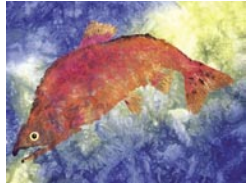

Where to See Art**Garden of Weeden***Haines Junction*

This fantasy garden created by Al MacLean is made of brightly painted burls in the shapes of dragons, snakes and other creatures. In summer wildflowers flourish, giving the garden a mystical appearance. Viewers are asked to respect the owner's privacy by viewing the garden from the road only.

The Millennium Quilt depicting the mountains around Haines Junction and the intersection of the Alaska Highway and Haines Road hangs on the stairwell wall just through the main doors of the convention centre. Based on a design by local artist Libby Dulac, the 1.8 m x 2.7 m (6' x 9') quilt was machine stitched by the Threadbears Quilt Group.

The atrium, through the convention centre's main doors and to the right, contains *The Ceramic Mural Project*. This 1.2 m x 4.3 m (4' x 14'), mural is composed of 224 individual ceramic tiles, each of them handmade, painted and glazed by the students of St. Elias Community School. The centre of the mural features a mountain scene, with side panels of flowers and First Nation symbols. The border tiles picture fish, plants and flowers.

The convention centre also has a 4.9 m x 1.8 m (16' x 6') fabric-appliqué mural entitled *The Cultural Landscape of Kluane*. The mural depicts a typical scenic view in Kluane. There are also 12 panels that depict historically significant events that have occurred in the Kluane region since 1890. Each panel covers one decade. The last panel is devoted to local events that celebrated the new millennium, with a focus on youth.

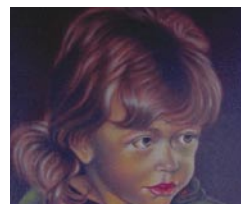

The centre also displays mukluks by Rosie Tom, a traditional Northern Tutchone outfit made of caribou, and other artifacts such as beaded slippers produced by local artisans. Murals by Whitehorse artist Chris Caldwell (#27) depict the landscape of the area. Outside the centre, a short scenic trail leads you to various stations where you can see examples of historical lifestyle activities such as a moose-skin tanning camp and a winter moose-skin home. Klondike

The legendary Klondike Gold Rush brought thousands of hopeful gold seekers to the Yukon more than a century ago. Dawson, the heart of the Klondike, now relies on its boardwalk-lined streets, historic sites, colourful festivals and surrounding scenery to romance modern-day visitors. Dawson is also the gateway to the Arctic Circle and the Tombstone Territorial Park, known for its jagged black granite peaks.

When it comes to art adventures, no one leaves the Klondike with broken dreams. Visitors who expect to find the craft of jewellery-making alive and well are never disappointed. They may be surprised, however, to discover that many of Dawson's artists also specialize in carving ivory from prehistoric mammoth tusks unearthed by local mining operations.

North Yukon

North Yukon offers visitors the magical experience of around-the-clock summer daylight. From May 4 to August 7, the sun never sets on the vast landscape of tundra and permafrost north of the Arctic Circle. Much of the region is protected within parks, some offering limited access, others inviting wilderness adventures. The area is also home to muskoxen, bears, arctic foxes and the giant herd of barrenland caribou that sustains the Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation's culture and economy.

Accessible only by air but rich in its isolation, the tiny village of Old Crow is a place that few visitors or even Yukoners ever reach. What inevitably awaits those willing to make the effort is a priceless education in Vuntut Gwitchin traditional arts and culture, which have flourished along the banks of the Porcupine River since time immemorial.

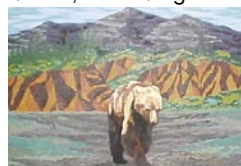
